There is an anticipation in the air unlike any other time in the Jewish year—that wonderful feeling of seeing people you have not seen, of greeting old friends, of hugging and kissing those we love and care about, of going up to someone and offering a mazel tov or expressing joy for their good fortune or offering words of consolation for a loss, or a word of

encouragement.

Although we cannot gather at this time in our sacred space, we can gather in the sacred space we have created online. Since March we have had Shabbat, festival and weekday services, classes and programs on Zoom. We have praved, learned. celebrated and mourned together in what is now our congregation's virtual shul. Cantor Greenberg and I have been buoyed by the increased attendance at services via Zoom. But we have also been deeply touched by the warmth and camaraderie expressed by congregants for each other, especially at the end of each service, when people have the opportunity to greet each other.

Our task for the High Holy Davs as a shul community is to bring God's presence into our homes through a Zoom screen and create as intimate and as deep a spiritual experience as we can.

You may notice that services will be different this year. We have shortened them wherever we could so that they can translate better to the virtual format. We have provided a time flow (most

times are approximate), so that you can make your own choice when to attend, and so you will know what parts of the service are taking place at specific times.

Cantor Greenberg and I, along with the Ritual Committee, have been hard at work to craft a High Holy Days experience that we hope will be meaningful, comforting and uplifting. But we cannot do this alone. We need your help.

When you log onto and attend any Zoom service, especially on the High Holy Days, you have entered into our congregation's sanctuary. It might be a virtual space, but when you enter our Zoom room you are "in shul."

Each of us therefore needs to create our own sacred space in our homes before we arrive at services on Zoom:

## 1. Create a High Holy Days **Sacred Environment**

- Choose a room in vour home that will be comfortable and not have distractions.
- Make sure before you enter the Zoom room that your TV and cell phone are turned off (you would never bring a television into the sanctuary)
- If you have a landline phone consider taking it off the hook for the duration of services.
- Sequester pets.

#### 2. Dress the Part

- Dress for Yom Tov— wear shul-appropriate clothing and get into the High Holy Days vibe.
- Men should wear a kippah at all services. Both men and women should wear a

tallit—if it is your custom—at morning services on Rosh Hashanah and at all services on Yom Kippur (evening and daytime).

#### 3. Mahzor in Hand

• Have your High Holy Days prayer book, Mahzor Lev Shalem (or digital copy), at the ready. Page numbers will be announced and projected on the Zoom screen.

#### 4. Sing and Pray Along with the Hazzan

• Although we will be muted, we can all sing along with Cantor Greenberg at home

In every generation we Jewish people have had our challenges and blessings. We live in an age of technological wonders that allow us to connect in new and vital ways. Yet, amidst the whir of our gadgetry—if we prepare for these High Holy Days by crafting a sacred space and setting aside sacred time then we can come into God's presence, and our souls can be graced by the touch of Eternity.

We call these days the Yamim Noraim —The Days of Awe. Together let's make them Awesome!

For dinner on Rosh Hashanah there should be symbolic foods on the table: two round challot (representing the crown or turban of God's kingship or a ladder reaching upwards) and apples dipped in honey (or dip your Challah in honey). The latter signifies our hope for a good, sweet year!

When serving the apples, after dipping the cut-up sections in the honey, the family should say together:

YEHI RATZON SHETICHADESH ALENU SHANAH TOVA UMETUKA

"May it be Your will that we have a good and sweet year!"

# CANTOR'S CORNER: FINDING INSPIRATION IN THE MOST INTIMATE MOMENTS DURING THE BIGGEST DAYS OF THE YEAR

I cannot even begin to tell you how many times friends, family, congregants, teachers, colleagues, and complete strangers have asked, "When did you know you wanted to become a Cantor?" or some other version of that question. It seems that choosing to become a clergy member is assumed to involve a defined calling or a profound moment.

Admittedly, I struggled, pinpointing my answer over the last few years while I was a student at the Jewish Theological Seminary. I had been asked so many times, I felt obligated to identify a specific moment; but I did not think I had one. Eventually, it hit me.

Seven year-old Jacob Greenberg had just spent all day at Rosh Hashanah services standing up and sitting back down, singing with the congregation and toggling between the Hebrew and the English during silent davnen, and listening to the Cantor and his choir.

After my family and I arrived back at our home, I immediately ran upstairs to my room and shut the door behind me. I faced my window, looked up to the sky and, at the top of my lungs, began belting Avinu Malkeinu. I thought to myself, 'If I sing as loud and as passionately as possible, then surely G-d would hear me and respond.'

It took me around 18 years to realize that that moment is almost exactly what everyone imagines before they inquire about my career choice. Upon reflecting on this still vivid memory, though, something strikes me. And what strikes me is not the moment itself, but rather its context.

What comes to mind when you think of and envision the Yamim Nora'im (the High Holy Days)? It might be the apples and honey, the fasting and the subsequently essential breakfast, or the singing of timeless congregational melodies. It could be your family's traditions or your own individual customs. But what is universal for everyone who attends Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services is the picture of a sanctuary filled to the brim at maximum capacity. When we wake up for services on any of those three days, we know these are the "biggest days of the Jewish year."

How funny is it, then, that the powerful moment that solidified my path to the Cantorate was private and intimate in my tiny childhood bedroom on a day that is very public and amplified in a large space?

In the 1st Book of Kings (Chapter 18), Elijah the Prophet finds himself outnumbered by 450 prophets of the idol Baal. Elijah decides to organize a public demonstration with them to see whose prophetic abilities could conjure a divine fire. After simultaneously proving his connection with G-d and disproving the validity of theirs with Baal, Elijah commits an act of violence and rids the Land of Israel of the false prophets. Unfortunately for Elijah, his zealotry incites King Ahab and Queen Jezebel and they threaten Elijah that they will do the same to him. Elijah decides to run away and finds a cave:

"There he went into a cave and there he spent the night. Then the word of G-d came to him... 'Come out and stand on the mountain before the Lord.' And then G-d passed by. There was a great and mighty wind, splitting mountains and shattering rocks by the power of

the Lord; but the Lord was not in the wind. After the wind—an earthquake; but the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake—fire; but the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire—a soft murmuring voice" (I Kings 19:9-12)

This passage contextually teaches us that G-d is not found in acts of violence (wind, earthquakes, and fire), but rather in acts of peace ("a soft murmuring voice").

It just so happens that that Hebrew phrase Kol Demama Daka can be found in the famous High Holy Days text Untaneh Tokef towards the beginning of the Musaf service. The second paragraph of this prayer begins, "And the great Shofar is sounded, and a soft murmuring voice is heard." Even though the purposefully loud and alarming nature of the Shofar is a central theme of the Holidays, ultimately it is G-d's thin and still voice that is most pronounced.

The High Holy Days, at their core, are about achieving teshuva, or repentance. It is about reflecting on the past year, recognizing what we did right and wrong, who we need to connect with in order to make amends, and planning how we will approach this new year from a more enlightened perspective and continue to grow throughout.

It is often very difficult to find moments of reflection leading up to and during these momentous days. We all know, however, that these Days of Awe will look very different from years past. We have a truly unique opportunity to experience these High Holy Davs as never before. This year, we can dive deeper into our Teshuva than ever before, affording us the chance to approach 5781 with endless possibilities of individual growth and growth in our relationships. On these High Holy Days, let us all find inspiration in the most intimate of moments during the biggest days of the year.
